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

Where's the best place to start my trip?

You can start your adventure anywhere on the Cascade Loop. We like to present the information in an organized way, so we identify our nine regions beginning in Seattle NorthCountry, at the ferry dock in Mukilteo. The main highway systems flow more than 440-miles from the Salish Sea in Western Washington, over the mountains, across the shrub steppe of Eastern Washington, and through the lush valleys in-between.

Through river valleys and national forest lands, you cross the Cascade Mountain range not once, but twice. The Cascade Loop is a perfect encapsulation of all the best Washington State has to offer - scenic beauty, amazing recreation, and fabulous food and beverages from farms, fields, rivers, and salt water!

For those planning to explore the Loop in its entirety, we recommend traveling counterclockwise through the nine distinct regions, to see the most scenic views of our iconic landmarks, including Liberty Bell on Highway 20. Some do it in a long weekend, but our recommendation is to savor the journey and allow a week or more. No need to rush. There's plenty to see, do, and experience.

Bear in mind, at some point after snow begins falling in the mountains, a 44-mile stretch of the North Cascades Hiahway will close west of Mazama and east of Diablo. The Loop becomes the "Cascade Crescent", and is still worthy of the title "Washington State's Ultimate Roadtrip!"

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Where can I fly in and rent a car to access the Loop?

Depending on where you're flying from, we have a few options: Sea-Tac International Airport near Seattle, Pangborn Memorial Airport in Wenatchee, Paine Field Passenger Terminal in Everett and Bellingham International Airport, in Bellingham.

Can my RV or travel trailer handle the Cascade Loop?

Absolutely! Our scenic byway is comprised of well-maintained roadways courtesy of our friends at WSDOT and we have all manner of RV-equipped campgrounds on and near the byway.

Kick off your Cascade Loop adventure in Seattle NorthCountry, which boasts 2,000 square miles of mountains, rivers, cities, towns, farmlands, and coastlines in Snohomish County. Look for three distinct environments on this part of the Loop: coastal communities, river valleys, and urban centers. This region enjoys a temperate climate year-round, making it an ideal destination for outdoor adventures in every season. Mukilteo

A coastal community on the shore of the Salish Sea, and the unofficial "beginning" of the Cascade Loop.

Attractions & Activities

Spannese Gulch. 144-acre urban forest with miles of trails for biking, hiking, dog walking, and trail running. Home to woodpeckers, great blue herons, and black-tailed deer. Four trailheads. <u>mukilteowa.gov</u>

Lighthouse Park. Grounds are accessible year-round to visitors. The lighthouse, exhibits, and gift shop are open weekends and holidays, 12pm-5pm, April through September. The 14-acre Lighthouse Park offers access to the beach, with picnic areas, boat launch, and playground. 609 Front St.

Tails and Trails Dog Park. A ¾-acre, fully fenced off-leash dog area complete with agility equipment. 1301 5th St.

Washington State Ferry. Gateway to Whidbey Island (Clinton/Mukilteo route) . A new terminal opened in 2020 with Native-inspired architecture and interior artwork. <u>wsdot.wa.gov</u>

The largest metropolitan community on the Loop. This vibrant urban center is known for international cuisine and a growing waterfront district. It is home to Paine Field Airport (PAE) along with several historic aviation attractions, including the Boeing Factory Tour.

& Millwright Loop Trail. Nearly four miles of paved walkways along the waterfront, Boxcar Park, the Marina, Jetty Landing and boat launch, interpretive signage. Birding and marine life hot spot!



Snohomish

A charming historic town nestled along the banks of the Snohomish River, known for its picturesque Main Street, lined with antique shops, boutiques, and a rich sense of community. Enjoy great restaurants, which include a fish house, a pie company, and several breweries, featuring locally crafted beers.

Attractions & Activities

Centennial Trail. A 30-mile paved walking, jogging, biking, and soft surface equestrian path, built on the old Burlington-Northern railroad line. The trail travels north through Arlington to the Skagit County line. There are multiple trailheads and access points. seattlenorthcountry.com

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Monroe

A welcoming community surrounded by natural beauty, offering a mix of outdoor adventures, including parks, trails, and a quaint downtown with local shops and eateries. Several boat launches draw anglers to the Skykomish and Snohomish Rivers for salmon, steelhead and cutthroat trout. Sip suds and spirits at three breweries, a whiskey bar, and a taphouse.

AI Borlin Park. An oasis in an urban setting, this park is the largest in Monroe (90 acres). It offers picnic areas with barbeques and beach access. Trails weave through a thickly wooded area which include views of the Skykomish River. 615 Simons Rd, (*no permit needed*).

Historic Downtown. Venture off US 2 and explore Historic Main Street. Grab a beer at a local brewery and shop for unique, locally made treasures. Enjoy farm-to-table, or ethnic dining. Step back in time at the Historical Society & Museum.

Evergreen State Fairgrounds. Home of the largest county fair in the Northwest. Fair dates for 2024 are August 22-27 & 29-September 2. Indoor dog park in Arena #606. Nov-Feb. RV Camping available Apr-Oct (except during fair). (360) 805-6727.

Evergreen Speedway. Featuring NASCAR races and specialty events year-round.

Lake Tye. Enjoyed by kayakers and paddleboarders, this 42-acre lake also includes a swimming area, 1.63-mile loop trail, and a street-style skateboard park. Mid-summer evenings offer free concerts, dancing, and a beer garden. In 2024, home of the Nautique WWA Wakeboard & Wakesurf National Championships (July 25-28)

Mural Walk. Let art inspire you! Tour 11 one-of-a-kind outdoor murals by artist David Hose.

Skykomish River. An angler's delight, and fun for rafters looking for all classes of whitewater, from calm to "boulder drop" adrenaline racing!

Wiggly Field Dog Park. 2½ acre off-leash park, with agility equipment, and a dog drinking fountain. 413 Sky River Pkwy.

Stevens Pass Greenway

Wallace Falls State Park



Pass through lush farmland as you follow the Skykomish River along Highway 2 (SR2) toward the jagged peaks of the Cascade Range. The Stevens Pass Greenway, a designated National Scenic Byway, serves up wild, inspirational views and prodigious hikes.

With an elevation of 4,061 feet, Stevens Pass Ski Area is a favorite for winter recreation. Once over the crest, you'll see the undergrowth change and adapt to the drier climate of the eastern side of the state.

Sultan

A quaint town with a rich logging history, nestled near the Skykomish River. Plenty of access to a range of outdoor activities showcasing a tight-knit community atmosphere.

Sky Valley Information Center. Get the inside scoop on the Loop and local must-visit locations. Pick up your Discover Pass, Northwest Forest Pass, and fishing and hunting licenses here. Closed Sunday. 320 Main St, (360) 793-0983, skyvalleychamber.com/visit

& Osprey Park. Accessible walking trails along the river, with a baseball field, basketball court, and playground. Offers front-row seats to a pink salmon phenomenon, when thousands of the fish fill the Sultan River to spawn in the fall (odd years ONLY). Join onlookers here at the Return of the Salmon celebration (Sept. 28, 2024).

Travelers Rest and Dog Park. Just off SR 2 on the east side of town, near many great road trip treat options and a coffee stop!

Gold Bar

A scenic gateway to the Cascade Range. Renowned for its outdoor adventures including hiking, camping, bouldering, and its proximity to the beautiful Wallace Falls State Park.

Off-Leash Dog Area. Just off the highway along SR 2 is a perfect fenced wiggle stop!

Wallace River Hatchery. Continuous operations since 1907 with paved paths and educational opportunities. A birding hot spot. 14418 383rd Ave SE.

Index

Established in 1907, this tiny, picturesque town is well known for its stunning mountainous backdrop, outdoor recreation opportunities, and the iconic Index Town Wall, a magnet for rock climbers seeking adventure.



Attractions & Activities

North Fork Kitchen. Located in the Bush House Inn, serving delicious, high-quality meals using fresh, locally sourced ingredients. 308 5th Street, (425) 298-7642, <u>bushhouseinn.com</u>

Espresso Chalet. Grab a snack and a coffee for the road. Picnic tables and incredible views of Bridal Veil Falls. Home to Harry, the lovable sasquatch from the movie "Harry and the Henderson's" filmed in part right here! Milepost 36, SR 2 near Index, (360) 793-7932.

Heybrook Ridge County Park. A 1.6-mile trail of moderate difficulty through natural regrowth forest which culminates in stellar views of the Skykomish Valley. Parking is available but there are no facilities. Pack it in, pack it out! 50606 Index-Galena Rd, (*no permit*).

Index Town Wall. A 500-foot vertical climb considered to be one of the nation's premier rock-climbing spots. Parking area off Old Goldbar-Index Road, just west of town, (*Discover Pass*).

Mount Index. 5,991' tall, it towers over the valley - the views and photo ops are spectacular!

Land of Waterfalls

Bridal Veil Falls. The falls begin in a narrow draw near Mount Index. They widen and fall down rocky cliffs, forming several distinct "veils" which are visible from the highway. For a closer look, hike the challenging Lake Serene Trail and spur trails to a viewing deck where you are close enough to feel the spray. Milepost 35, near Index. (NW Forest Pass).

Deception Falls. Follow the ½ mile interpretive ADA-accessible trail to a bridge that spans the Upper Falls. Cross footbridges and admire the rock formations carved by the force of the river as you descend into a mossdrenched forest and meander along rocky streams. Picnic area, nature loop, restrooms. Milepost 56, (no permit needed).

Wallace Falls State Park. Three tiers of water drop in nine falls from a height of 265 feet. Twelve miles of foot trails offer a variety of views. Parking is limited so plan to arrive early, especially on weekends 14503 Wallace Lake Rd, Gold Bar, (Discover Pass).



Skykomish

A charming mountain town surrounded by the beauty of the Cascade Range. Known for its historic Great Northern Railway influence, and the scenic Skykomish River, winding through the heart of the community.

Attractions & Activities

Depot Park and Railroad Museum. Home to the Great Northern & Cascade Railway, a miniature live steam railroad (open weekends May-Oct), and railroad museum, open select hours all year. 101 N. 5th St, <u>gncry.com</u>

Skykomish River. Anglers line the riverbanks, and drift boats float the more tranquil waters with surround prized fishing holes. Great winter steelhead fishing! Immensely popular for whitewater rafting.

Cascadia Inn and Cafe. Chat with locals and fill up on hearty, all-American fare. Serving homestyle food for 100 years. Offering travelers a cozy place to unwind, watch the trains go by and warm up after a long day of hiking, skiing, or just driving the Cascade Loop! Restaurant open Friday-Tuesday. historiccascadia.com

Stevens Pass Bike Park. Two types of trails, Freeride and Technical, offer adventures for bikers of all skill levels.

Wellington. At the eastern end of the Iron Goat Trail, this is the site of tragic train disaster in 1910. Trail takes you through historic snow sheds, designed for easy access in wheelchairs. (*No permit needed here*)

Having descended Stevens Pass, you reach the intersection of SR 2 and Highway 207, known locally as Coles Corner. Continue along SR 2 winding through the magnificent Tumwater Canyon, on your way to Bavarian Leavenworth. During spring, melting snow streams off granite spires overhead, filling the Wenatchee River as it tumbles through the canyon.

For an idyllic side loop, head east at Coles Corner (Highway 207) to Plain and the Lake Wenatchee area, before circling through the scenic Chumstick Canyon to Leavenworth. Recreation opportunities abound here (see side loop on page 26).

Leavenworth

A world-famous Bavarian-themed village nestled in the Cascade Mountains, delighting visitors with its charming architecture, year-round festivals outdoor activities, and a welcoming atmosphere that transports visitors to a European alpine setting.

Leavenworth Ski Hill. Less than 2 miles from downtown, offering two downhill ski runs, snowshoeing, tubing, Nordic skiing and a ski jump during the winter months, plus mountain biking and hiking trails during the summer! <u>skileavenworth.com</u>

Tumwater Canyon. As SR 2 winds its way toward Leavenworth, wayside pull-off spots dot the roadway offering views of wildlife and scenery. In late September through mid-October, this canyon is awash with autumped colors. Travelers and photographers from ground the w



If you can travel midweek in this region, we highly recommend it! Traffic flow in and out of Leavenworth can be very busy on weekends and parking can be a challenge, so please plan accordingly.

Our mountain trails and parking areas fill up quickly, so if trailhead parking is full please find an alternative trail to explore. We have many other options!

Plain & Lake Wenatchee

For a Scenic Side Loop, the remote region north of Leavenworth offers lakeside camping at Lake Wenatchee State Park, boating, swimming, and golf. Winter brings 150 inches of annual snowfall and great ski and snowshoe opportunities. Loop back to Leavenworth over Beaver Pass and through Chumstick Canyon.

Watchable Wildlife

All manner of animals live in the natural areas surrounding the Cascade Loop. What you see during your trip will depend on the season, time of day, weather, and how far from the roadway you explore. Animal behavior varies.

Enjoy looking for and photographing wildlife but be alert and safe! Keep a safe distance from all wildlife, do not attempt selfies with critters, and do not offer them your food.

The Cascade Loop begins and ends along Washington State's Puget Sound. From the car, you may spot seabirds, shorebirds, and waterfowl. Get out of the car for a chance to see otter, sea lion, crab, orca, gray and humpback whales, sea urchins, and sea stars. Your best bet for seeing all of these is to book a trip with Anacortes Kayak Tours or Whidbey Island Kayaking.

Western river valleys are favorite spots for hundreds of species of birds and waterfowl. Look for snow geese, trumpeter swans, and tundra swans in winter.

While driving through the mountains, be on the lookout for deer, coyote, bald eagle, and osprey.

In the backcountry, you may encounter black bear, mountain goat, elk, cougar, raccoons, skunks, and whistling marmots.

Driving through eastern river valleys, you may see deer, rabbits, coyotes, bighorn sheep, blue heron, bald and golden eagles, osprey, wild turkey, and turkey vulture.


Away from the highway, you might encounter gray wolves, black bear, cougar, beaver, raccoon, skunk, whistling marmots, grouse, bobcats, badgers, moose, mountain goats, grouse, wild turkey, wolverine, lynx, bobcat, and pikas.

Stehekin

There are no roads to the tiny, uplake, mountain village of Stehekin – It is accessible only by boat, helicopter, or by hiking in. The Lady of the Lake passenger ferry leaves Chelan, with regularly scheduled service to Stehekin and back. The

Stehekin Valley is the southern gateway to North Cascades National Park. Hundreds of miles of trails carry hikers into four adjoining wilderness areas, with access to the Pacific Crest Trail. While in Stehekin, ride horses, kayak, bicycle, or fish.

Lakeshore Trail. Take this trail to Stehekin from Chelan, at the end of the lake. For the day hiker out of Stehekin, several areas provide fantastic photo opportunities.

McGregor Mountain Trail. This hike can be a day or overnight hike, but it is only for those in good physical condition. The pay-off is the Sahale Glacier, incredible views and landscape you thought only existed in National Geographic. 8 miles to the summit.

Rainbow Falls. A picturesque, 312-foot waterfall with two viewing areas that get you close to the splash pool.

Rainbow Loop Trail. Trailhead begins at the Stehekin Valley Road, 3 miles from the landing. At the first bluff you will have views of the Stehekin River winding down-valley past Buckner Orchard. Farther along you'll enjoy panoramic views of Lake Chelan. 6.5 mile loop.

Stehekin River Trail. Beginning at Harlequin Campground and ending at Weaver Point, this level, cool, and tree shaded trail is great for a summer stroll. Four miles one way.

Hiking Etiquette & Tips

Hiking is just like most every other activity or sport—there are unwritten rules that when followed, make the experience much more fun for everyone. And likewise, when not followed, can either drive people crazy or in the worst case scenario, be dangerous. Because we're in the business of inviting folks from all over the world to come and join us on the trail we figure we would be remiss if we didn't give folks a few pointers.

Passes & Permits

Passes and permits are necessary parts of hiking in Washington state as they help with funding and upkeep for public lands, as well as keeping foot traffic down in fragile areas. Most commonly, you may find yourself needing a Northwest Forest Pass or a Discover Pass.

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Leave No Trace

This is pretty simple really: Clean up your mess and pack out everything you brought with you. Be sure to plan ahead and bring garbage bags if necessary. This goes doubly for your dogs!

Additionally, leaving no trace means not taking plants, rocks, or any other naturally occuring objects. (Good news, you can take all the pictures you want!)

Parking at Trails

There are a few important rules with parking at trailheads:

Park like you're in a parking lot. You should be as close to the car next to you as you would be at a grocery store.

Display the necessary pass depending on where you're hiking.

Lot full? Consider finding another, less populated hike nearby (we promise, there are lots around!)

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Stay on the Trail

There's no need to start cutting switchbacks or going cross-country when there is a perfectly good trail. This only causes erosion, hurts delicate plants and may loosen rocks that could hurt hikers below you.

Be Prepared

From checking the forecast ahead of time and wearing weather-appropriate clothing to packing a bag with a simple first aid kit, snacks, and water, it's good to be prepared.

Be sure to download the trail on your preferred app while you have cell service.

It's also important to look into the hike you're planning on tackling to ensure you know the elevation gain, distance, and difficulty.



Tick Country

Ticks are nasty little buggers and unfortunately we have quite a few of them around Washington. If hiking on a trail known for having ticks, it's a good idea to wear long sleeves and pants tucked into your socks to lessen the opportunities for ticks to latch on.

After your hike, be sure to check your body (and your dog's, if needed) thoroughly.



Hiking with Dogs


When hiking with your dogs, you are also responsible for your dog's behavior on the trail. Be sure that you are only taking your dog on trails where dogs are allowed. Trails that do not allow dogs are likely trying to protect sensitive ecosystems.

In places where signed as such, dogs should be kept on a leash.

Also, nobody wants to step in what your dog may leave behind. We all have to clean up our own dogs' messes.

In winter, trails are great for snowshoeing and cross-country skiing, with a full-service ski shop and expert ski instruction.

Interpretive Loop Trail. One mile. Complete with signs detailing the geology, flora and fauna of the area and expansive valley views making it a favorite for hiking and snowshoeing.

Kraule/Sunnyside Loop. 2.5 mile. Provides spectacular vistas of Mt. Gardner, Mt. Robinson, and the North Cascades.

Beaver Pond/Rodeo Loop. 2.5 mile. Offers a shaded trail and an occasional beaver sighting!





Mazama

World-renowned rock-climbing destination with some of the best single and multipitch sport climbing in Washington. Last opportunity to fuel up before you reach Marblemount on the other side of the pass. During winter, this is the last community you can reach before the seasonal road closure

Goat Peak Lookout. This 3.5-mile trip is worth the dazzling scenery and incredible views. The first half mile starts off relatively easy, with the elevation gains of 1400 feet over a series of switchbacks in the next 3 miles.

Hart's Pass. The highest point in the State of Washington that one can drive, but this is not for the faint of "Hart"! The narrow road hangs along a cliff wall, and passing oncoming vehicles can be very challenging even for sedans. The views are breath-taking. The road ends near

Many roadways of the Cascade Loop travel through areas abundant in wildlife, and we ask drivers to be extra vigilant and on the lookout for large and small animals who may cross the highways and roadways all around the Loop.

Elk herds in the Skagit Valley are often seen near the road. The Wenatchee River Valley and the Methow Valley see large deer populations, especially during the winter. Highway 97-A between Wenatchee and Chelan is home to several herds of bighorn sheep, and rams occasionally stop traffic on the roadway to get a better look at

Winter Closure Information

The North Cascades receive abundant snowfall each year, causing Highway 20 to close for the season in late fall/early winter, and reopen in spring, depending on conditions. The closure is from milepost 178 (west of Mazama) to milepost 134 (east of Diablo). This means our Loop becomes more of a crescent, and travelers should schedule accordingly.

North Cascades

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Diablo Lake from Overlook



Marked by the massive bulk of Liberty Bell and Early Winters spires, SR 20, North Cascades Scenic Highway, is a designated byway located on the Cascade Loop. It is surrounded by jagged peaks and valleys, waterfalls, and more than 300 glaciers within the North Cascades National Park. Several peaks rise well above 9,000 feet in elevation! Not surprisingly, hiking, climbing, and camping are hugely popular here. (A nice perk about North Cascades National Park is that there is no entry fee, a rarity among national parks.)

Over the Pass

As you travel up and over the crest of Washington Pass (elevation 5477'), you will reach the brilliant, turquoise-colored Ross and Diablo Lakes. Views from these glacier-fed lakes reach north to Canada and south into the most-glaciated valley in North America outside of Alaska.

State Route 20 leaves the towering peaks of North Cascades National Park and follows the Skagit River through the Skagit Valley's mountain foothills and acres of farmland, through artistic communities, to the coastal beaches of Fidalgo Island. Fields are dotted with rustic farmhouses and farmstands with spectacular views of 10,781-foot Mount Baker and the North Cascades. This area is home to the largest commercial flower bulb industry outside of the Netherlands. Beginning in March and continuing through April, the entire Valley is a carpet of blooms. In the winter, witness the migration of more than 80,000 snow geese, swans, birds of prey, and more!

For a spectacular Side Loop, head north on Highway 9 toward Mount Baker and circle through Bellingham, then south on Chuckanut Drive to meet back up with Highway 20 (see page 68).



If You Plan to Hike, Camp, or Play at a Park or in the Forest ...

... chances are you'll need a pass of some kind. To determine which pass(es) you need, consider which agency manages the land where you want to explore, and whether it is managed by the federal government or the State of Washington.

Federal recreation sites include: national forests, national parks, national wildlife refuges, national historic sites, Bureau of Land Management lands, and places managed by the Bureau of Reclamation. An **Interagency Pass** allows named passholders into all of these sites. A **Northwest Forest Recreation Pass** allows trailhead parking on national forest land for \$5/car for one day or a \$30 annual pass. The pass is available at national forest offices and visitor centers, ranger districts, private vendors, or online at fs.usda.gov/main/r6/passes-permits

The Discover Pass is required to park at Washington State parks, Department of Natural Resources lands and Department of Fish and Wildlife trailheads. Purchase your Discover Pass Day Pass for \$11.50/ car. For a full year's worth of use, purchase the Annual Discover Pass for \$35. Buy your pass online or in-person from nearly 600 recreational license vendors where state fishing and hunting licenses are sold (processing fees may apply).

2024 Forest Service Fee Free Days

On these days, standard amenity fees at federally operated sites will be waived. Participation for concessionoperated sites may vary. The Forest Service waives standard recreation fees at sites nationwide to celebrate: June 8 – National Get Outdoors Day June 19 – Juneteenth September 28 – National Public Lands Day November 11 – Veterans Day For 2025 Fee Free Dates, check fs.usda.gov/visit/passes-permits

State Parks Discover Pass Free Days

Washington State parks offers several "free days" when a Discover Pass is not required to visit a state park. Dates in 2024 are: June 8 - National Get Outdoors Day June 9 - Free Fishing Day June 19 - Juneteenth Sept. 28 - National Public Lands Day Oct. 10 - World Mental Health Day Nov. 11 - Veterans Day Nov. 29 - Autumn Day

Order your Discover Pass online and check 2025 Free Days at discoverpass.wa.gov

Washington's Sno-Park Permits allow you to park at plowed lots accessible to groomed and backcountry trails. Day permits are \$25/day and are valid at any Sno-Park location, including Special Groomed Trail locations.

Day permits are valid until midnight of the purchase date, and can be purchased online at: https://epermits.parks.wa.gov/Store/SNO/SnoChoice.aspx Some Sno-Park areas also require a Discover Pass.


