



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The Cascade Loop Travel Guide is produced annually by The Cascade Loop Association, a nonprofit organization.



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The Cascade Loop is a 440-mile road trip that we identify in nine unique regions beginning at the ferry dock in Mukilteo. The main highway systems flow from the Salish Sea in Western Washington, over the mountains, along the of Eastern Washington, and through the lush valleys in-between.

Through river valleys and national forest lands, you cross the Cascade Mountain range not once, but twice. The Cascade Loop is a perfect encapsulation of all the best Washington State has to offer – scenic beauty, amazing recreation, and

fabulous food and beverages from farms, fields, rivers, and salt water!

Bear in mind, at some point after snow begins falling in the mountains, a 44-mile stretch of the North Cascades Highway will close west of Mazama and east of Diablo. The Loop becomes the "Cascade Crescent", and is still worthy of the title "Washington State's Ultimate Road Trip!"

Launch GPS and download your map before you hit the road!

The majority of the byway has great service but there are spots where you may lose signal and a few regions where service can be spotty.

If you use your phone for GPS navigation, map your route before you leave to ensure you don't lose your way!

Your Cascade Loop adventure begins in Seattle NorthCountry, with 2,000 square miles of mountains, rivers, cities, towns, farmlands, and coastlines. Look for three distinct environments on this part of the Loop: coastal communities, river valleys, and urban centers. A temperate climate year-round makes it an ideal destination for outdoor adventures in every season.

♣ Lighthouse Park. The 14-acre park offers access to the beach with picnic areas, boat launch, and playground. Grounds are accessible to visitors year-round. & Mill Town Trail. Wide, shared use sidewalk path through the Waterfront District. Great views of Port Gardner Bay and the Port of Everett and showcases area history. 6.8-mile trail with multiple access points.

Snohomish

A charming historic town nestled along the banks of the Snohomish River, known for its picturesque Main Street, lined with antique shops, boutiques, and a rich sense of community.

Monroe


A welcoming community surrounded by natural beauty, offering a mix of outdoor adventures, including parks, trails, and a charming downtown with local shops and eateries. Several boat launches draw anglers to the Skykomish and Snohomish Rivers for salmon, steelhead and cutthroat trout. Sip suds and spirits at three breweries, a whiskey bar, and a taphouse.

Historic Downtown. Venture off US 2 and explore Historic Main Street. Shop for unique, locally made treasures and enjoy farm-to-table, or ethnic dining. Step back in time at the Historical Society & Museum.

Evergreen Speedway. Featuring NASCAR races and specialty events year-round.

Lake Tye. Enjoyed by anglers, kayakers, and paddleboarders, this 42-acre lake also includes a swimming area, 1.63-mile loop trail, and a street-style skateboard park. Mid-summer evenings offer free movies, concerts, dancing, and a beer garden. 14964 Fryelands Blvd.



Stevens Pass Greenway

Pass through lush farmland as you follow the Skykomish River along Highway 2 (SR2) toward the jagged peaks of the Cascade Range. The Stevens Pass Greenway, a designated National Scenic Byway, serves up wild, inspirational views and prodigious hikes.

Sultan

A quaint town with a rich logging history, nestled near the Skykomish River. Plenty of access to a range of outdoor activities showcasing a tight-knit community atmosphere.

- **❖ Osprey Park.** 85 acres with over two miles of flat, wide, gravel walking trails through forest and wetlands along the the river. Baseball field, basketball court, and playground. Offers front-row seats to a pink salmon phenomenon, when thousands fill the Sultan River in the fall to spawn. Join onlookers here at the Return of the Salmon celebration (Sept. 27, 2025). 705 1st St.
- * Mountain View Park. Concrete walking trail, picnic areas, restroom, and a playground, all with great views of the Cascades. 14027 Dogwood Ct.



Gold Bar

A scenic gateway to the Cascade Range. Renowned for its outdoor adventures including hiking, camping, bouldering, and its proximity to the beautiful Wallace Falls State Park.

Off-Leash Dog Area. Just off the highway along SR 2 is a perfect fenced wiggle stop!

Reiter Foothills State Forest. Closed Winter. Park featuring trails suitable for dirt biking, rock crawling, and ATV riding. 46110 Reiter Rd. (*Discover Pass*).

*Wallace Falls State Park. This 1380-acre park sits along the Wallace River and also features three lakes and numerous waterfalls. Popular spot for mountain biking, fishing, swimming, boating, kayaking and rock climbing. 14503 Wallace Lake Rd. (Discover Pass).

Wallace River Hatchery. Continuous operations since 1907 with paved paths and educational opportunities. Audubon Cascade Birding Trail location. 14418 383rd Ave SE.



Land of Waterfalls

Bridal Veil Falls

The falls begin in a narrow draw near Mount Index before they widen and fall down rocky cliffs, forming several distinct "veils" which are visible from the highway. For a closer look, hike the challenging Lake Serene Trail and spur trails to a viewing deck where you are close enough to feel the spray. Milepost 35, near Index. (NW Forest Pass).

Deception Falls

Follow the ½-mile interpretive ADA-accessible trail to a bridge that spans the Upper Falls. Cross footbridges and admire the rock formations carved by the force of the river as you descend into a moss-drenched forest and meander along rocky streams. Picnic area, nature loop, restrooms. Milepost 56. (no permit needed).

Wallace Falls State Park

Three tiers of water drop in nine falls from a height of 265 feet. Twelve miles of foot trails offer a variety of views, including a 1/4-mile interpretive trail, and a 2.8-mile hike to the top of the falls. Parking is limited so plan to arrive early, especially on weekends.

Index

Established in 1907, this tiny, picturesque town is well known for its stunning mountainous backdrop, outdoor recreation opportunities, and the iconic Index Town Wall, a magnet for rock climbers seeking adventure. Mount Index, at 5,991' tall towers over the valley -- the views and photo ops are spectacular!

* Bridal Veil Falls Trail. The trail starts off following an abandoned road through the forest. There are a few stream crossings. At two miles the trail ends at the falls. (NW Forest Pass).

Index Town Wall. A 500-foot vertical climb considered to be one of the nation's premier rock-climbing spots. Parking area off Old Goldbar-Index Road, just west of town. (Discover Pass).

Outdoor Adventure Center. From calm streams to "boulder drop" adrenaline racing whitewater and family raft adventures and kayaking expeditions. Professional kayak school and

Stevens Pass

Ascend 4,061' Stevens Pass where the views are mind-blowing year-round! Access the Pacific Crest Trail from the ski resort parking lot (South and North Trailhead). Be prepared to encounter snow in the winter. Check conditions at wsdot.com/traffic/passes

Bygone Byways. This flat, well-marked 1-mile loop trail follows the original route of the Great Northern Railway. Interpretive kiosk at the trailhead explains the natural and cultural history of the area. Westbound access only at Milepost 69.

♣ Deception Falls Trails and Picnic Area. Parking area has picnic tables and vault toilet. Follow the ½-mile nature loop and interpretive trail to a bridge that spans the Upper Falls. Cross footbridges and admire the rock formations carved by the force of the river as you descend into a moss-drenched forest and meander along rocky streams. Milepost 56. (No permit needed).

★ Iron Goat Trail. Gentle grades and various hiking options at each trailhead to accommodate visitors of all abilities. Three access points to this glimpse of railroad history in the region. Reach the Caboose and Interpretive site at milepost 66.4. The trail also connects to historic Wellington, the site of a tragic train disaster in 1910. Walk through historic snow sheds, designed for easy access in wheelchairs. (NW Forest Pass).

Stevens Pass Bike Park. Two types of trails, Freeride and Technical, offer adventures for bikers of all skill levels.



Having descended Stevens Pass, you reach the intersection of SR 2 and Highway 207, known locally as Coles Corner. Continue along SR 2 winding through the magnificent Tumwater Canyon, on your way to Bavarian Leavenworth. During spring, melting snow streams off granite spires overhead, filling the Wenatchee River as it tumbles through the canyon.

For an idyllic Side Loop, take Highway 207 to Plain and the Lake Wenatchee area, before circling through the scenic Chumstick Canyon to Leavenworth. Recreation opportunities abound here (see Side Loop on page 24).

Leavenworth

This world-famous Bavarian-themed village is nestled in the Cascade Mountains and delights visitors with its charming architecture, year-round festivals, and outdoor recreation. A welcoming atmosphere transports visitors to a European alpine setting.

Enchantment Park. Meandering walking and biking trails wind through the forest and along the Wenatchee River, where birding and wildlife watching is popular. Playground equipment, pump track, skate park and ball fields. 300 Enchantment Park Way.

Leavenworth Fish Hatchery. Self-guided tours and exhibits identify fish species. Picnic area and a 1-mile easy trail teaches about salmon, river ecology, and the role of fish hatcheries. 12790 Fish Hatchery Rd, (509) 548-7641, fws.gov/leavenworth

Leavenworth Ski Hill. Less than 2 miles from downtown, offering two downhill ski runs, snowshoeing, tubing, Nordic skiing and a ski jump during the winter months, plus mountain biking and hiking trails during the summer! skileavenworth.com

Tumwater Canyon. As SR 2 winds its way toward Leavenworth, wayside pull-off spots dot the roadway offering views of wildlife and scenery. In late September through mid-October, this canyon is awash with autumnal colors. Travelers and photographers from around the world trek to this part of the Loop to capture photos of the brilliant colors.

* Wenatchee River Institute. Waterfront interpretive walk and birding on a 9-acre nature reserve, which is always open to visitors! Seven gardens, forest, fields, and trails with access to the Wenatchee River. Natural and cultural history interpretation. Great habitat for a variety of bird and wildlife species! 

Plain & Lake Wenatchee

For a Scenic Side Loop, the remote region north of Leavenworth offers lakeside camping at Lake Wenatchee State Park, boating, swimming, and golf. Winter brings 150 inches of annual snowfall and great ski and snowshoe opportunities. Loop back to Leavenworth over Beaver Pass and through Chumstick Canyon.

Hidden Lake. Only 1.2 miles round trip, so both the beginner and advanced will easily accomplish this hike through a peaceful slice of nature, with pines and old-growth cedar.

Lake Wenatchee State Park. 492-acres on glacier-fed Lake Wenatchee and the Wenatchee River. Play at the beach, or walk the family-friendly, level path along the lake. Onsite paddleboard and kayaking rentals during summer. North and South parks have camping (including limited winter camping). (509) 763-3101, parks.wa.gov/535/Lake-Wenatchee. (*Discover Pass*).

During winter, this is the last community you can reach before the seasonal road closure. Methow Trails connect Mazama and Winthrop with groomed winter rec trails, and summer hiking and biking trails.





The North Cascades receive abundant snowfall each year, causing Highway 20 to close for the season in late fall/early winter, and reopen in spring, depending on conditions. The closure is from milepost 178 (west of Mazama) to milepost 134 (east of Diablo). This means our Loop becomes a crescent, and travelers should schedule accordingly.





North Cascades

As you climb up the highway from the Methow Valley you will see the amazing and iconic Liberty Bell and Early Winters spires. North Cascades Scenic Highway is a designated byway located on the Cascade Loop. It is surrounded by jagged peaks and valleys, waterfalls, and more than 300 glaciers within the North Cascades National Park. Several peaks rise well above 9,000 feet in elevation! Not surprisingly, hiking, climbing, and camping are hugely popular here.

(A nice perk about North Cascades National Park is that there is no entry fee, a rarity among national parks.)

Over the Pass

As you travel up and over the crest of Washington Pass (elevation 5477'), you will reach the brilliant, turquoise-colored Ross and Diablo Lakes. Views from these glacier-fed lakes reach north to Canada and south into the most-glaciated valley in North America outside of Alaska.

& Happy Creek Forest Walk. Just east of milepost 134. Short loop trail through a stand of old-growth forest, mostly on boardwalk. Parking, restroom. (No permit needed)

North Cascades Environmental Learning Center. Drive over Diablo Dam, turn right and park at the end of the road. Nature-based field trips, overnight adventures, and online learning for adults, youth, and families. Diablo Lake Trail departs from the parking lot. Milepost 127.5, neascades.org

Ġ Rainy Lake. The parking area is shady with picnic tables. A 1-mile accessible trail to Rainy Lake also offers several benches. 
Bellingham





If You Plan to Hike, Camp, or Play at a Park or in the Forest ...

... chances are you'll need a pass of some kind. To determine which pass(es) you need, consider which agency manages the land where you want to explore, and whether it is managed by the federal government or the State of Washington.

Federal recreation sites include: national forests, national parks, national wildlife refuges, national historic sites, Bureau of Land Management lands, and places managed by the Bureau of Reclamation. An Interagency Pass allows named passholders into all of these sites. A Northwest Forest Recreation Pass allows trailhead parking on national forest land for \$5/car for one day or a \$30 annual pass. The pass is available at national forest offices and visitor centers, ranger districts, private vendors, or online at fs.usda.gov/main/r6/passes-permits

2025 Forest Service Fee Free Days On these days, standard amenity

On these days, standard amenity fees at federally operated sites will be waived. Participation for concession-operated sites may vary. The Forest Service waives standard recreation fees at sites nationwide to celebrate: June 14 – National Get Outdoors Day June 19 – Juneteenth September 27 – National Public Lands Day November 11 – Veterans Day For 2026 Fee Free Dates, check fs.usda.gov/visit/passes-permits

The Discover Pass is required to park at Washington State parks, Department of Natural Resources lands and Department of Fish and Wildlife trailheads. Purchase your Discover Pass Day Pass for \$11.50/car. For a full year's worth of use, purchase the Annual Discover Pass for \$35. Buy your pass online or in-person from nearly 600 recreational license vendors where state fishing and hunting licenses are sold (processing fees may apply).

State Parks Discover Pass Free Days

Washington State parks offers several "free days" when a Discover Pass is not required to visit a state park.
